3:15pm	The Impact of the Federal BOLD Act - Growing State Action on Dementia In 2018, the federal Building Our Largest Dementia (BOLD) Infrastructure for Alzheimer's Act was enacted, paving the way for growth in dementia-specific programs in state public health departments across the country. This session offers the opportunity to learn how the implementation of the BOLD Act, led by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), is transforming state action across the country through grants to state agencies. You will also learn about the work the new Public Health Centers of Excellence are doing to create resources and educational opportunities to support efforts at the state level, with emphasis on risk reduction, early detection and diagnosis, and caregiver support.
